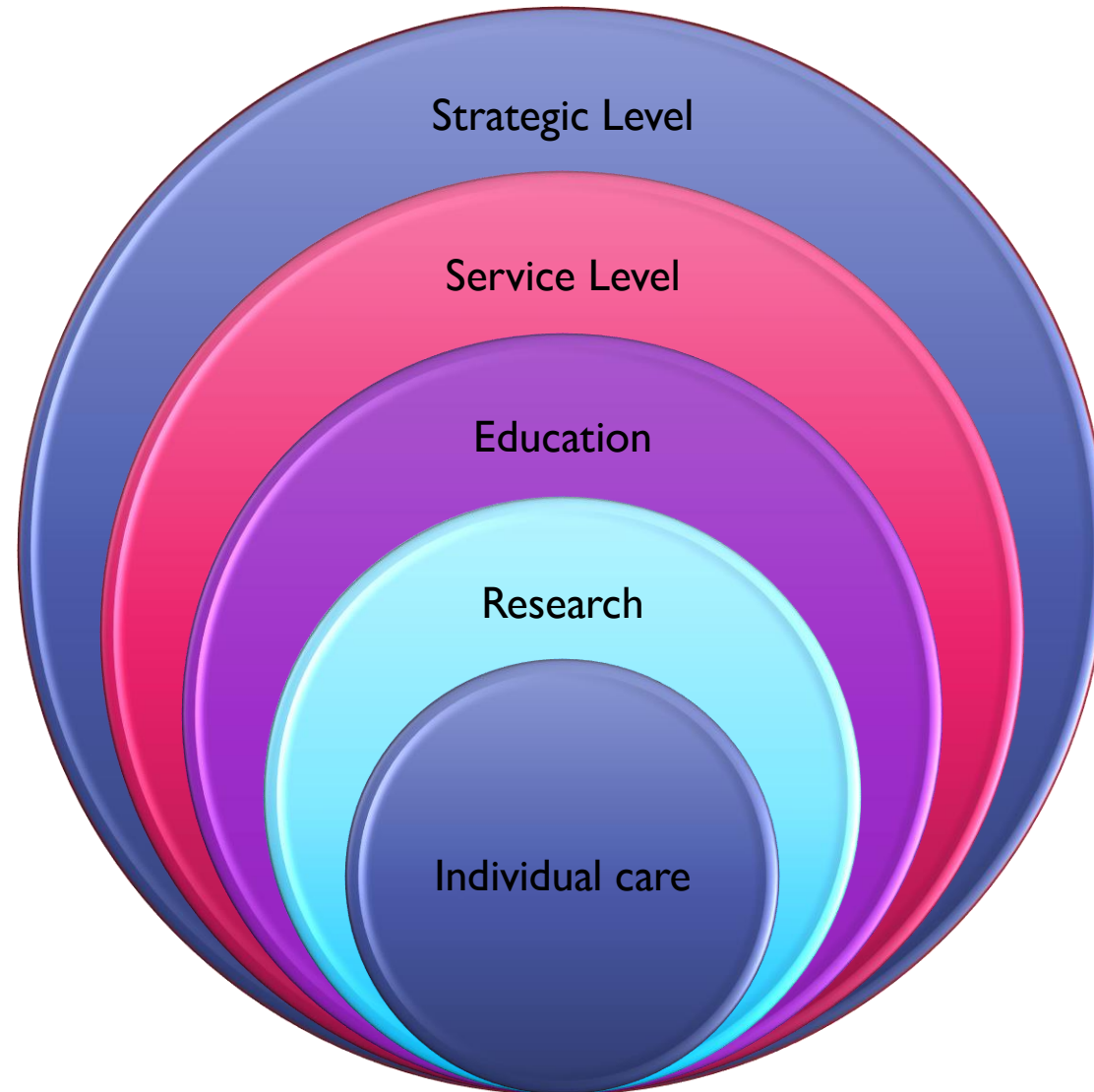

Legislation and Policy

**“Coproduction” is when an individual influences the support and services received, or when groups of people get together to influence the way that services are designed, commissioned and delivered.’
(Care Act 2014; TLAP, 2022)**
